We have been working hard on consolidating our numeracy knowledge and showing understanding of this in several ways. It's been good to see many students' eyes light up as they start to grasp different aspects of addition and subtraction.

We have started a unit on New Zealand Treasures. It has been interesting to hear students' experiences of travel and holidays throughout Aotearoa. Our focus is learning where we fit into the map of New Zealand and then moving out to significant places for our students. Along the way we are placing details on maps and looking at why some cities have icons.

With cooler temperatures in the mornings, we are seeing more school fleeces being worn, which is great. Please make sure they are named. Many are being left and not claimed at the end of the day. The countdown is on till the end of the term and a well deserved break for students and teachers.

Kuaka

Kuaka Hub have been working hard on our learning focuses. We even enjoyed or endured a couple of Chromebook free days due to some technical issues! We had a large group head off to Interschool Swimming Sports to represent our school. It was an awesome day and everyone who attended should be proud of their efforts!

We had Te Kenehi Teira visit us last week to share his expert knowledge on Foxton Beach's local history sites and taniwha. He shared important messages around kaitiakitanga (guardianship and protection - a way of managing our environment based on the Māori world view) - teaching our students the importance of conservation. This conversation was important because Sonja Hart (local artist) is working with a large group of our Year 5 and 6 students who are working on a mural project which will be in the alleyway between Pratt Ave and Seabury Ave. The mural is based on the taniwha that Te Kenehi shared with us. The students have done an amazing job so far and we can't wait to see the final product. Some of the Year 7 and 8 students will get to work with Sonja next term..

We have our goal setting meetings next week and are looking forward to seeing some of our students whānau come in to discuss their learning and personal goals.
